- Students are allowed to take high school credit courses
- Students who successfully complete 7th Grade PAP Math may be placed into Algebra 1.
 - Algebra I is a high school credit course
 - Students enrolled in Algebra I PAP are required to take the STAAR End of Course Exam.
 - Grade points are earned toward high school GPA (Grade Point Average).
 - Students must have credit for both semesters of Algebra I before they can enroll in any other high school math course.

PAP & Schedule Change Information

PAP

- Pre-Advanced Pathway (PAP) courses are more complex and abstract.
- The courses emphasize the academic study and performance skills to help prepare or continue the advanced learner to successfully complete the Advanced Placement (AP) classes in that subject area.
- LCISD students who attended Middle and/or Junior High School in this district will continue the higher-level skill building that they previously experienced in the four core subject areas.
- Parents may choose PAP classes for students in Skyward
- Any student who fails a PAP class for the school year must still attend summer school

Schedule Changes

- We build our master schedule off course requests. After a student chooses a class, it is difficult to move a student later in the year when they decide that class may not be for them.
- Most times, the entire schedule must be changed and teachers are changed.
- We build the number of sections based off course requests. When students request to move this creates imbalances in class sizes.
- Please be sure you want the classes you are choosing! There is a specicific window for schedule changes
























Beginning Orchestra

Intro to Theater Arts

*Covers the fundamentals of acting and theatrical production.

*Classroom activities include mime / pantomime, improvisation, characterization, technical theatre (including: scenery, lighting, sound, costuming, hair / makeup), and play production.

*Emphasis placed on a variety of inclass performances and individual / group presentations







Intermediate Theater Arts

*Prerequisite: Introduction to Theatre or teacher approval

*Continuation and progression of the Intro to Theatre course. *Students will be given higher-level activities involving acting, oral interpretation, technical theatre, and the elements of theatre production *Designed for students who are planning on participating in all aspects of play production.

*Students may have the opportunity to audition for productions. *These events will require additional preparation and involvement after school.











Theatre Production

*Prerequisite: Intermediate Theatre or teacher approval

*This advanced course is for students who have a desire to be involved with play productions.

*This course is a continuation and progression of the theatre arts curriculum.

*The nature of this course will require participation in afterschool rehearsals.

AUDITION AND/OR TEACHER APPROVAL REQUIRED

Career Investigation

- Wondering what CTE is all about?
- Wondering what career clusters and training is available at your school?
- Discover different career choices available in high skill, high demand job areas.
- Explore key concepts in each CTE Career Cluster along with learning leadership and computer skills career/workplace etiquette, and career development.
- Career Clusters focus includes Family Consumer Sciences Agriculture, Construction & Transportation STEM/Engineering and Business.
- This class is geared for 7th grade students as an introductory course to CTE and Endorsement Career Clusters available in LCISD.
- 8th graders may elect to take this course. Hands-on projects and cooperative learning will be utilized when available.









- The eighth-grade AVID Elective course is the year of preparation for high school.
- The students will regularly exhibit and utilize the skills and strategies learned in seventh grade AVID.
- Students will refine previous goals, focusing on their transition to high school as part of a college preparatory path.
- Other areas of focus include broadening their experiences with analyzing text and utilizing appropriate reading strategies, becoming more involved in the presentations of guest speakers and field trips, particularly as they relate to preparation and prior knowledge.







What are the advantages of earning high school credit in junior high school?

•This may allow your child to complete graduation requirements early, allow them to take more elective courses in high school, and provide challenging course work to your child.

• Grade points are earned toward <u>High School GPA</u> grade point average for all high school credit courses in junior high.


High School Course Schedule Changes in Junior High

- A student may drop a high school credit course in junior high up through the first progress report of the semester.
- If a student drops a high school credit course through the first progress report, that student must be scheduled into a non-high school credit course as a replacement.
- This can be very difficult to do. Please make sure you are prepared for the HS credit classes you are choosing.
- 8th Grade students are given priority in Spanish and French classes. 7th Grade students will be reviewed on a case-by-case basis to determine if they are prepared for these classes.

Semester Grade Determination for High School Courses

A semester grade consists of three six weeks grades and the semester exam. The three six weeks grades average together for 80% of the semester grade and the semester exam counts as 20% of the semester grade

High School Credit Gurses- 7th and 8th



Every student in Texas must take TWO years of a World Language to graduate. Courses must be in the SAME language.

Junior High options: you can start your language credits in JH with Spanish or French. These courses do count towards your HS GPA.

High School options: we offer French, Spanish, or American Sign Language.

Do you speak Spanish already? Sign up for our Spanish for Spanish Speakers course this class earns you TWO years of credit in ONE year!

Spanish 1

PREREQUISITE: Prior year Language Arts grade (first semester) of an 85 or higher.

*This is the same Spanish 1 course offered in grades 9-12

*Focus is authentic, real-world communication, as students make connections and compare their own language and culture to the communities of the Spanish-speaking world. This course focuses on the six AP themes. *Classes are conducted in the target language for 90% of the time, with great attention to comprehensible input which includes: slower speech, repetition, modeling, frequent checks for understanding, visuals, gestures, frequent opportunities for students to practice, and use of English only when necessary. Grade points are earned towards high school **GPA (Grade Point Average)**

Students assessed regularly in the three modes of communication: 1.Interpersonal (unscripted conversation in order to complete a task) 2.Interpretive (reading, listening, viewing) 3. Presentational (rehearsed and revised oral and written products). THIS CLASS IS CONDUCTED **IN SPANISH A SIGNIFICANT** AMOUNT OF TIME.

Spanish II

PREREQUISITE: Spanish I

*Continues the development of listening, speaking, reading and writing in the Spanish language.

*Focus is authentic, real-world communication, as students make connections and compare their own language and culture to the communities of the Spanish-speaking world. This course focuses on the six AP themes.

*Classes are conducted in the target language for 90% of the time, with great attention to comprehensible input which includes: slower speech, repetition, modeling, frequent checks for understanding, visuals, gestures, frequent opportunities for students to practice, and use of English only when necessary. Students assessed regularly in the three modes of communication: 1.Interpersonal (unscripted conversation in order to complete a task)

2.Interpretive (reading, listening, viewing)

3.Presentational (rehearsed and revised oral and written products). THIS CLASS IS CONDUCTED IN SPANISH A SIGNIFICANT AMOUNT OF TIME. *Limited Accommodations



Spanish for Spanish Speakers I &II

Reading, listening, speaking & writing proficiency screening in Spanish with a minimum score of an 80.

* Students may receive credit for Spanish I and
 II upon successful completion of these courses in one year. Grade
 points

are earned toward high school GPA (Grade Point Average). *Designed for students who are heritage or native speakers of Spanish. Their basic skills will be strengthened with an emphasis on vocabulary, reading, writing, and grammar skills at more advanced levels. The focus of this course is on increasing student's ability to use Spanish flexibly in both formal and informal situations by focusing on topics related to the six AP themes.







French I

PREREQUISITE: Prior year Language Arts grade (first semester) of an 85 or higher.

This is the same course as French I offered in grades 9 - 12.

- Course focus is authentic, real-world communication, as students make connections and compare their own language and culture to the communities of the Frenchspeaking world.
- Focuses on the six AP themes.
- <u>Classes are conducted in the target language</u> <u>for 90% of the time,</u> with great attention to comprehensible input which includes: slower speech, repetition, modeling, frequent checks for understanding, visuals, gestures, frequent opportunities for students to practice, and <u>use of English only when necessary.</u>

Students assessed regularly in the three modes of communication: 1.Interpersonal (unscripted conversation in order to complete a task) 2.Interpretive (reading, listening, viewing) 3.Presentational (rehearsed and revised oral and written products).

French II

PREREQUISITE: French I

This is the same course as French II offered in grades 9 - 12.

- Course focus is authentic, real-world communication, as students make connections and compare their own language and culture to the communities of the Frenchspeaking world.
- Focuses on the six AP themes.
- <u>Classes are conducted in the target language</u> <u>for 90% of the time,</u> with great attention to comprehensible input which includes: slower speech, repetition, modeling, frequent checks for understanding, visuals, gestures, frequent opportunities for students to practice, and <u>use of English only when necessary.</u>



Students assessed regularly in the three modes of communication: 1.Interpersonal (unscripted conversation in order to complete a task) 2.Interpretive (reading, listening, viewing) 3.Presentational (rehearsed and revised oral and written products).

*Limited Accommodations

High School Credit Courses- 8th only

HS Art 1

Art I is a comprehensive course that provides the student with introductory experiences in inventive and imaginative expression through a variety of art experiences, media, and techniques.

Emphasis is placed on the elements and principles of design.

*Students may be required to purchase some materials, or an art fee may be required to cover the cost of materials, including a sketchbook.

- Provides insight into the operation of a well-run restaurant.
- Provides safety and sanitation, insight to food production skills, various levels of industry management, and hospitality skills.
- This is an entry-level course for students interested in pursuing a career in the food service industry.
- This course is offered as a classroom and laboratory-based course.




